Jeffrey DeBoer Acceptance Speech

Thank you all so very much . . . good evening . . .

I know what you all are wondering . . .

...Who is this fellow receiving the Lamplighter Award ... and how did this happen!?!?!?"

And, finally, I want to acknowledge those with us tonight who currently serve, or who did serve our country . . .as well as the many people here tonight who work positively on behalf of their nation.

Please join me now in thanking these service members, as well as the Ambassadors, diplomats, health providers, first responders and teachers who are here with us.

Today of course is September 11th.

A date etched into our minds.

A day when evil struck.

A day when innocent people lost their lives.

A day when people, here in America and around the world, stood together in announced opposition to narrow minded, senseless killing and oppression.

A day we must never forget.

Eleven months ago evil struck again . . this time in Israel.

Many innocent people were violently killed and many were senselessly abused.

251 men, women and children were taken hostage and removed from their place of choice.

The safe release of these hostages must be everyone's priority of course . . .but. . .

Just as 9-11 is etched in our minds . . . so must be 10-7 . . . the evil of terror must not be allowed to stand.

By being here tonight you know that is our duty as individuals to stand up for what is right and to fight against injustice wherever we see it.

I am honored to support the American Friends of Lubavitch. . .particularly because of my deep respect and appreciation for the good deeds the Chabad does.

But also because of my utter dismay at . . . and disgust by . . . the rise of anti-Semitism in America . . . and in many places around the world.

Just two days ago an arrest was made in Canada of a person charged with planning a terrorist attack in New York City around October 7 with the stated goal of slaughtering in the name of ISIS, as many Jewish people as possible.

Moreover, I am moved to provide assistance because of my deep distress over the violence that has been planted and allowed to grow on the campuses of our nation's greatest universities. We must realize that speech is sometimes violent . . .But violence is never speech. One is allowed . . .up to a point. The other should never be allowed particularly on university campuses where young people are supposed to be learning

Together we must continue to stand up against hate and bigotry in all its forms. . . History shows that hate allowed to stand will only grow more and more.

So, instead of a joke, I'll end with a story.

Like most of you here tonight I fly quite a bit . . .and perhaps like many of you I don't really like to talk much on the plane with whoever sits next to me.

Recently on a flight . . . an older woman sat down next to me and said "hello young man . . . my name is Goldie, how are you?"

Before I could answer . . . and for the two hours, Goldie told me everything about her life, marriage and especially about her grandchildren. She even produced a plastic-foldout photo album of all nine of the grandchildren and reviewed all of their traits with me.

I really didn't say anything.

Suddenly Goldie became troubled and I guess finally realized that she had dominated the entire conversation with me and spent considerable time talking about her grandchildren.

And she stopped and looked and me and said "Oh, I'm so sorryI've done all the talking.. I know you certainly have something to say.

Please, tell me... what do you think of my grandchildren?"

May we all continue to enjoy long lives, share our good fortunes, enjoy much laughter and few tears . . .

And may we all work toward unity not division . . . so that we all have brighter and more harmonious futures.
